

New Member Spotlights

LTC Emil Kovalchik, USA (Ret.) & Kimberly Kovalchik



Emil and Kimberly Kovalchik moved to Johnson City in June 2023 from Tampa, Florida.

Emil served in the active Army for 20 years, retiring as a Lieutenant Colonel in 1999. He earned a commission as a Second Lieutenant through Army ROTC and reported to his first assignment at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, where his service included deployment for Operation Urgent Fury to

Grenada. Other assignments included the 21st Support Command in Kaiserslautern, Germany, and the 24th Infantry Division (Mechanized) at Fort Stewart, Georgia, where he fought with the division in Operations Desert Shield/Storm in Saudi Arabia and Iraq.

Emil then returned to Fort Bragg for an assignment first in the 82nd Airborne Division and then in the 18th Finance Group (Airborne), where he planned and executed the Group's operations in Somalia and Haiti. Finally, he was posted to the Washington, DC area where he served as the Comptroller Assignment Officer in Alexandria, Virginia, and then moved to the Pentagon serving on both the Secretary of the Army Staff and the Army Staff.

Emil is currently the Director of Business Development at American Ordnance, Middletown, Iowa. He has worked the past 25 years in the defense industry with other companies such as General Dynamics, OSRAM Sylvania and Chamberlain Manufacturing. He is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame with a BBA in accountancy. Emil was selected by the Army to attend its Comptrollership Program at Syracuse University, where he earned his MBA.

Emil has been married for 27 years to Kimberly (Archer) Kovalchik, Esq. Kimberly recently retired from the federal government where she first served as Associate Counsel for Ethics and Personnel for the Defense Logistics Agency at Ft. Belvoir, VA,

and then as Senior Attorney- Adjudicator for the US Social Security Administration in Tampa, FL. Kimberly received her BA from Wilkes University in Wilkes-Barre, PA, and her JD from American University in Washington, DC.

Kimberly and Emil have two adult sons, Nathan and Trevor. Nathan is a graduate of

Southern Methodist University in Dallas, TX, and is a Financial Leadership Development Program Associate at Raytheon/RTX. Trevor is a rising sophomore at Elon University in Elon, NC, where he is studying Political Science with plans to attend law school.

Heinrich (Henry) J. Reyes, COL, USA (Ret.)



Henry Reyes began his military career in the U. S. Marine Corps in 1973 as a ground radio repairman. Upon completing his MOS training, Henry was assigned to the 2d Tank Battalion at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. The M48 tank was being replaced by the M60 tanks and required transitioning communication equipment from the M48s to the M60s. Upon completion of the transition Henry was assigned to the 1st Marine Wing Communication

Squadron in Iwakuni, Japan. Several months later the unit transitioned to Camp Zukuran, Okinawa, now known as Camp Foster. His last assignment while on active duty was at Camp Pendleton, California with the 1st Marine Division.

After completing his USMC active-duty tour, he joined the Army National Guard while attending college. Upon graduating from the University of Alabama in Huntsville (UAH) with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration degree, Henry attended

Officer Candidate School (OCS) and received his commission in 1982 as a Communications (Signal) Officer. He then worked his way through the ranks and retired as a Colonel in 2012. Some of his assignments included Platoon Leader, TAC (Teach, Assess, Counsel) Officer at Officer Candidate School, Company Commander, Public Affairs Officer, S-3 Operations Officer, Battalion Executive Officer, Battalion Commander, Human Resources Officer and Joint Staff (J-6) Communications Officer. He also attended the Army War College (Class of 2004) receiving a Master's Degree in Strategic Studies. In addition, Henry also earned a Master's Degree in Public Affairs from the University of Alabama in Huntsville.

His final National Guard assignment was coming back on active duty at the National Guard Bureau (NGB) Operations (J-3) Joint Staff in Washington DC serving as the Combating Weapons of Mass Destruction (CWMD) Division Chief. In this position he was responsible for the National Guard's Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear

(CBRN) Response Enterprise (CRE). The CRE encompassed the manning, training, and equipping of approximately 10,800 personnel with an annual budget of \$325 Million. The CRE is comprised of 57 Civil Support Teams (CSTs), 17 CBRN Enhanced Response Force Packages (CERFPs) and 10 Homeland Response Forces (HRF). Henry retired from the military in 2012 but was asked to stay in his CWMD Division Chief position as a Department of the Army Civilian (GS-15) before retiring



in 2021. As CWMD Division Chief, Henry was responsible for the training and evaluation of the National Guard CRE units across the 50 states, District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands. In addition, he developed liaison and training opportunities with numerous CBRN units across the world to include England, Israel, Kosovo, Malaysia, Philippines and Romania to name a few in order to develop good working relationships and joint foreign training experiences for the CRE.

The CRE has been heavily utilized for numerous real world events to include the Columbia Space Shuttle disaster, 9/11 World Trade Center attack, Boston Marathon bombing, Presidential Inaugurations, tornados, hurricanes, bird flu events, and especially during the COVID-19 pandemic which involved the testing of over 500,000 samples from the military and civilian population, decontamination of facilities (i.e.: Nursing Homes), medical care at hospitals and care assistance facilities, and assistance in the vaccination process to include setting up COVID-19 testing stations and the actual vaccination process of military and civilian personnel.



Henry also spent 30 years with the Huntsville Police Department (HPD) before retiring as Chief of Police and going back on active duty at the National Guard Bureau. During his HPD career Henry's assignments included SWAT Team Officer, DUI Task Force Commander, Police Academy Director, Special Operations Commander, Deputy Chief and Chief of Police. During the 9/11 timeframe, Henry was the Special Operations

Commander responsible for the Bomb Squad, SWAT Team, K-9, and Traffic Units which were heavily involved in the Anthrax scare responses and responses to hundreds of calls by citizens worried about additional terrorist threats.

Henry was also the Incident Commander during the Eric Rudolph trial in Huntsville who was the Atlanta Olympics and Birmingham Alabama Abortion Clinic bomber. He also served on the Alabama Joint Terrorism Task Force Executive Committee with the FBI, DEA and other major Alabama Police Chiefs and Sheriffs. During his time with HPD, Henry received extensive training in WMD events. His dual military and police career was of great benefit to the National Guard Bureau and the first responder community having served in both arenas.

Henry's military awards include the Legion of Merit, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with 2 oak leaf clusters (OLC), Army Commendation Medal with 2 OLCs, Army Achievement Medal with 2 OLCs, Alabama Army National

Guard Distinguished Service Medal, Alabama Commendation Medal and 9/11 Mobilization Service Ribbon.

Henry's Department of the Army Civilian service medals and badges include the Department of the Army Civilian Superior Service Medal, Civilian Commendation Medal, Civilian Achievement Medal, Army Staff ID Badge and the National Guard Bureau Staff ID Badge.

He also received the UAH Alumni of Achievement Award in 2009. The award recognizes graduates who have distinguished themselves professionally and personally and who exemplify the high standards of UAH.

Henry and his wife Annie moved to Kingsport after retiring. Annie is originally from Kingsport. They have one son Scott, grandson Dylan and great-granddaughter Olivia.

Chris served 21 years in the United States Air Force as a Weapons System Officer in the B-1 and a Combat Systems Officer in the U-28.

Chris commissioned as a Second Lieutenant on Maxwell AFB in April 1999, and he went immediately to Specialized Undergraduate Navigation Training on Naval Air Station Pensacola, FL. He selected B-1s out of flight training and spent his first operational tour at Dyess AFB in Abilene, TX.


Chris deployed twice with the B-1s before returning to the training command on Naval Air Station, Pensacola, this time as an advanced navigation instructor. He then moved into the Air Force Special Operations world and spent the rest of his career

there. While in AFSOC, Chris flew in the U-28 and deployed several times to various locations around the world. He also served two staff tours: one at Headquarters Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC), Hurlburt Field, FL, and the other at Headquarters United States Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), MacDill AFB, FL. Chris finished his career as a Master Navigator and the Wing Inspector General for Cannon AFB, NM.

Chris is a graduate of The University of Texas – BA 1997, American Military University – MA 2011, and East Tennessee State University – HCMC 2020.

Jim Slaight, CDR, USN (Ret.)



Jim was commissioned from the US Naval Academy in 1969 and served on his first ship, USS Van Voorhis (DE-1028), out of Newport Rhode Island, conducting operations in the North Atlantic, Caribbean and Mediterranean oceans. While in the Naval Academy, Jim met his future wife, Mary Jane, and they married in January 1970. Jim's subsequent sea tours included USS Operations Officer, Badger (FF1071),

Executive Officer of USS Parsons (DDG-31) and USS (Ramsey FFG-2), and the staff of Commander Carrier Group Eight as Surface Operations Officer. Homeports were Long Beach, Pearl Harbor, San Diego and Norfolk respectively. Operations included East and West Coast, and Hawaii operating areas and operational deployments to the Western Pacific, South Pacific, and Indian Oceans as well as deployments to the Mediterranean Sea and Persian Gulf. Some of the operations included the Taiwan

Straits Patrol, South East Asian Treaty Organization exercises, and Joint and NATO exercises.

While deployed to the Med in 1970, Jim received orders to a combat tour in Vietnam where he served as the PSYOPS Officer to riverine forces in the Mekong Delta at Advanced Tactical Support Base Solid Anchor and later as Base Defense Officer and Political Warfare advisor to the Vietnamese Navy. Jim's oldest son was born while Jim was in Vietnam.

Jim's shore tours included teaching prospective Department Heads at the Navy's Destroyer School, later Surface Warfare Officer School, as the Tactical Warfare Officer course leader, Naval Post Graduate School, where Jim earned an MS in Systems Technology, Joint Command, Control and Communications, and the Office of the Joint Chiefs of Staff (OJCS). Following OJCS, Jim was assigned to an exchange tour with the Royal Navy, as the Foreign Navy Communications Officer and British Joint Staff Foreign Navy Communications Policy Officer. Jim was also the Royal Navy's representative to the Allied Naval Communications Agency. Jim and family returned to the US and Washington DC in 1990 where Jim served in the Naval Sea Systems Command as Assistant Director for non-Aegis Command and Control Systems. Jim retired from active service in July, 1992.

After retirement Jim remained in Washington, DC and provided consulting services to various Executive Branch agencies including the DoD, FBI, Interior, and FEMA as well as the Judicial Branch's Administrative Office of the US Courts. Jim retired for the second time in 2015 and Jim and Mary Jane, relocated to Piney Flats on Boone Lake where Jim enjoys everything about Eastern Tennessee.

- 2) Supporting Military Family Access to Children's Hospitals.

I was chatting with Representative Harshbarger a couple weeks ago, and she asked me about the support that MOAA was getting from the Tennessee House delegation. We are more effective with more numbers, so PLEASE sign up!

Revitalization of East Tennessee MOAA Chapter in Knoxville – The Knoxville chapter of MOAA has essentially died. The Tennessee Council of Chapters has identified this problem in the past few years, and only now are there aggressive efforts underway to revitalize the Chapter. This is a no-brainer to those of us in Northeast Tennessee, as we are a small chapter with only a few ROTC sites nearby and only a few hundred or so national MOAA members who are not members of the Mountain Empire Chapter of MOAA. While we are growing, thanks to aggressive outreach by our own membership, Knoxville has a state University of some size, both Army and Air Force ROTC programs, a good University football team, and several hundred national MOAA members.

We MUST help get a robust East Tennessee chapter of MOAA get resuscitated! A planning reception is under consideration for September 2024 or so, with a goal of identifying 5-7 national MOAA members in the Knoxville area who are willing to step up and get the Chapter going. Several of us from MECMOAA have committed to making the two-hour drive and helping to encourage the nascent chapter and get it going, along with Pete Warner, the President of the Tennessee Council of Chapters.
